- VENUE AND TRAVEL** The event takes place in the woods to the north east of Dudmaston Hall. The event will be signed from the A442 just south of Quatford at SO739899.
- PARKING** Parking will be on Heath Farm meadow at SO745902.
- TERRAIN** Dudmaston is a pleasant mature wood, quite runnable. It is undulating with an extensive path network. The courses will be quite fast as the technical difficulty is somewhat limited. There are some areas of brambles (less so in March) and the courses will aim to avoid these areas.
- MAP** 1:10,000, 5m contours. Map amended by Colin Spears 2008
- COURSES** White, yellow, orange, light green, green and blue.
- ENTRIES** On the day
- TIMES** 10:00 – 12 noon, starts 10:30 – 12:30
- PUNCHING** Electronic punching using SportIdent. SI-cards may be hired for £1.
- FEES** £9 seniors (£2 discount for National members of British Orienteering and local only British Orienteering members from WMOA), £2 juniors, £2 seniors on White, Yellow and Orange courses.
- DOGS** Dogs on leads only
- FACILITIES** Toilets in car park field
